

INTRODUCTION

This booklet is designed to give you an overview of the options available to you when you leave school.

As well as preparing you to take your examinations in the summer, our aim is to give you as much information and guidance to help you make an informed choice for you when you move on to your next steps.

Today is about giving you the opportunity to learn about and explore the pathways that are available to you, focussing more on those you have expressed an interest in.

Our aim is to help you

- Understand the options available to you after Year 11
- Find out more about what is available to you locally and give you the chance to research your options further
- Give you more information about how to access the different options available to you.

Your choices after Year 11 will be the first time you will be able to choose where you learn, how you learn and what you learn.

It's important that you have as much information as possible to make the choices that are right for **YOU**.

Post 16 Education – What are my options?


Full-Time Study – this could be a qualification taken at a sixth form, college or training provider, totalling 540 hours of learning time per year, or around 18 hours per week.

Apprenticeships – this involves working for an employer while studying for a qualification as part of your training. Usually, work makes up 80% of an apprenticeship and at least 20% (or one day a week) should be dedicated to studying.

Traineeships – this is an option for students who would like to do an apprenticeship but may not have the experience, skills or qualifications to do so yet. Traineeships can last up to six months and involve a work placement, Maths and English qualifications and support with finding an apprenticeship.

Part-Time Study with Employment or Volunteering – this could be working in a full-time job (classed as any work that takes place over more than two months and is over 20 hours per week) or volunteering (again, over 20 hours per week) while studying part-time at a college or training provider (totalling 280 hours of learning per year).

FUTURE PATHWAYS



Everyone needs to be in learning until 18

- Sixth Form and Further Education colleges vary greatly in the range of courses they offer and the environment you will be learning in.
- Some colleges have large class sizes and some are much smaller. A sixth form at a school will offer you smaller class sizes and could be a better option if you would find a large campus overwhelming.
- Larger colleges offer a greater variety of subject choices and the options to get involved in more extra-curricular activities.
- Consider the subject choice, location and environment to find the best fit for you.
- Training providers offer many specialised vocational courses in a smaller environment.
- Apprenticeships are real jobs you have to compete for.

OVERVIEW OF OPTIONS AVAILABLE

SIXTH FORM COLLEGES

Sixth form colleges typically focus on A Level (Advanced Level) qualifications. These are normally two year courses that end in an overall examination and a grade from A*-E, with a similar structure to GCSEs but looking at the subject in a lot more depth.

Students can study:

Traditional A-Levels – Subjects like Biology, Chemistry, Physics, English Literature, English Language, Mathematics, Geography, History, Languages, Religious Education, Music, Art

Alternative A-Levels – Subjects like Photography, Law, Sociology, Psychology, Business Studies, Film Studies, Media Studies, Economics, Politics, Sports Science

BTEC L3 Diplomas – Some sixth form colleges offer BTEC qualifications that can be taken alongside A Levels. These are usually made up of a number of separate modules and include practical assessments and coursework, as well as exams. Subjects can include Health and Social Care, Applied Science, Travel and Tourism and Engineering.

Students studying A-Levels usually select three (depending on their GCSE grades they can select a fourth) that they want to study at sixth form and if they study four, can choose to drop one subject after their first year of sixth form. Students can also choose to study a one-year AS Level qualification, which is worth 40% of an A-Level. Sixth form colleges also offer something called the Extended Project Qualification (EPQ), an independent project that can provide students with UCAS points to put towards university.

Entry Requirements:

Most sixth form colleges usually ask students to have 5 GCSEs at Grade 4 or above but make sure that you do your research, as some courses, such as A-Level maths, physics, biology, chemistry and history require students to achieve a Grade 6 at GCSE in those and supporting subjects in order to demonstrate their deeper understanding of the subject (e.g. History A Level might require a Grade 6 at GCSE in history and English language).

You can also choose to take your A Levels at a school with a sixth form.

GENERAL FE COLLEGES

Generally offer a wider range of BTECs and vocational courses and can also offer A Levels. Vocational courses can include Hair and Beauty, Childcare and Construction, Business Management, Games Design, Automotive Engineering, Food Technology, Fashion Design, Performing Arts and Photography – each college will offer different choices.

Entry Requirements:

Entry Level/Level 1 – Can require anything from no qualifications up to 3 GCSEs (any grade)

Level 2 – Usually requires 3 GCSEs at Grade 3 or above

Level 3 – Usually requires 5 GCSEs at Grade 4 or above

T-Levels

T Levels are new courses coming in September 2020, which will follow GCSEs and will be equivalent to 3 A Levels. These 2-year courses have been developed in collaboration with employers and businesses so that the content meets the needs of industry and prepares students for work.

T Levels will offer students a mixture of classroom learning and 'on-the-job' experience during an industry placement of at least 315 hours (approximately 45 days). They will provide the knowledge and experience needed to open the door into skilled employment, further study or a higher apprenticeship.

Apprenticeships

Apprenticeships are an increasingly popular choice but are very competitive. They are real jobs with a recognised qualification. Employers pay a salary and are available at different levels. Apprenticeships are advertised throughout the year and you have to apply like a normal job.

Apprenticeships come in four different levels:

Intermediate/Level 2 (equivalent to GCSE) – usually requires Maths/English at GCSE

Advanced/Level 3 (equivalent to A-Level) – usually requires 5 GCSEs at Grade 4+

Higher/Level 4-5 (equivalent to Foundation Degree) – usually requires L3 or A-Levels

Degree/Level 6-7 (equivalent to University Degree) – usually requires 3 A-Levels or similar

Traineeships

Opportunity for students aged 16-24 who do not have the relevant qualifications, experience or skills to start an apprenticeship but are interested in progressing on to one in the future. **Traineeships** involve a programme of up to six months of study, including a work placement, qualifications in Maths and English and support with finding a job or apprenticeship once the course is completed. Students are not paid for taking part but can apply for a 16-19 Bursary Fund to help with costs.

APPRENTICESHIPS

Apprenticeship allow you to start working and earning a living straight from school, or college or university. They allow you to build valuable skills. An apprenticeship gives you practical on-the-job experience, essential learning tools and all-important qualifications that will last you a lifetime, wherever tomorrow takes you.

- **Work Experience** — You'll have a real job that you spend a majority of your time doing. Whether you're an engineer, lawyer or business administrator you'll be doing the same work as someone else in your job who wasn't doing an apprenticeship.
- **Mentor** — You'll get a workplace mentor who is someone that has lots of industry experience to support you through your job and qualification
- **Qualification** — whether you're working towards a qualification equivalent to GCSEs or up to a master level, you'll be studying as well as working.
- **Workplace skills** — developing the skills you need for the workplace and boosting your job prospects, your long-term career progression, and earning potential.

An apprenticeship is a real job. And employers respect them. In fact, they think that apprentices are 15% more employable than those with other qualifications. You'll be working alongside experienced people, supporting them and learning from them as you go. Working at least 30 hours a week, you'll gain most of the training you need in the workplace. But you may also go to a college, training provider, training centre or learn online to gain vital skills and qualifications.

Respected by employers across the world, an apprenticeship will lead to a national qualification, with a network of support available to give you all the help you need to do well. It's also in your employers' interest to help you succeed. And all your training will be designed with your employer. So, you can relax in the knowledge that you're learning the right stuff to get you ahead.

An apprenticeship is a great way to enjoy a successful start in work. As well as learning the skills and gaining the qualifications you want, you'll also gain confidence and the chance to learn while earning. Every apprenticeship is different and tailored to the industry or workplace.

Why should I choose one?

Apprenticeships are a great option for starting your career, particularly as an alternative to university. Apprenticeships offer a great opportunity to complete a qualification that interests you, as well as developing on the job skills to further your career.

How do I apply for an apprenticeship?

To apply for an apprenticeship, you can search on <https://www.gov.uk/apply-apprenticeship> or job website like www.getmyfirstjob.co.uk and find opportunities near you at the level you're looking for. You can filter by industries, salary and when the vacancy was added.

How much do I get paid?

You'll get paid a salary when you do an apprenticeship. This includes your employer paying you when you're working, when you're studying and also when you're on holiday! See the current wage rates:

Age	Current Rate
25 and over	£7.83
21 - 24	£7.38

Many apprentices pay much more than minimum.

How long do they last?

The minimum duration of an Apprenticeship is 12 months. This allows you the time to get your qualification and the industry experience required for your End Point Assessment (final sign off of your apprenticeship). Apprenticeships at a higher level, such as degree apprenticeships can last up to 6 years, you'll have a lot more coursework. Apprenticeships also tend to last longer in industries such as law or building surveying if you're working towards chartered status and qualifications.

What is apprenticeship training?

To find out about apprenticeships you need to know all about the training that goes into the qualification. As an apprentice, you'll spend 20% of your training working towards a qualification that you can apply to your day job. It depends on your provider and employer on what you'll be doing, you could study at work, at home or go to college or university to get your qualification. Some apprenticeships even involve you spending weeks away at a time doing block release!

What types of Apprenticeships are there?

Level 2 - Intermediate Apprenticeships – The equivalent to getting 5 GCSEs A*-C
Level 3 – Advanced Apprenticeships – The equivalent of L3 BTECs at College or A-Levels
Level 4, 5, 6 - Higher Apprenticeship – These are equivalent to the different levels at university. Level 4 is first year, level 5 is second year and level 6 is final year.
Level 6 – Degree Apprenticeship – This is the equivalent to getting a Bachelor's degree.
Level 7 – Professional Apprenticeship – This is the equivalent of a Master's degree.

Who can do an apprenticeship?

Apprenticeships are suitable for anybody at any age, although most people think they are just for school and college leavers. Whether you're looking to start your career after school or university, or you want to change your career route – apprenticeships are for everyone. Many employers even put their current members of staff on Apprenticeships to help them develop, this includes anything from management to engineering qualifications, so they learn the latest techniques.

What's after an apprenticeship?

What you choose to do after your apprenticeship is really up to you – there is lots of options. Many employers will ask you to stay after your apprenticeship as you already know the ins and outs of the business – often this comes with a pay rise too. When you complete your apprenticeship, you can choose to move to another organisation, or even move onto a higher-level course to further develop your skills.

Once you've started your apprenticeship you don't have to stay in employment, you still have the option to go to University or even to go on a gap year.

When do apprenticeships start?

Apprenticeships start throughout the year, so there are always opportunities available. If you want to find an apprenticeship you just have to search them online.

Bigger companies who recruit apprentices do have key hiring periods. These tend to be January, March and September however you should check employer websites to be sure about each employer, as they're all different.

Progression to apprenticeships

Opportunities for progression in an apprenticeship can be very vast, particularly with bigger organisations but also with small ones. This is because as you progress in your training and with the employer you can get more responsibility. Often, with taking more responsibility will also mean increments. You can also progress through the levels of apprenticeships, so you could start at an intermediate apprenticeship and work up to getting your degree.

Some organisations also do rotations within the company which will give you understanding of lots of business areas. This makes progression a lot easier as you really understand the entirety of the business you work in.

Apprenticeships are very competitive, so you should apply to college/colleges for September as well. That way, if you don't get an apprenticeship, you can still study. Whilst you're studying, you can still apply for apprenticeships or you can apply for a higher level apprenticeship once you have more qualifications.
